EARLY SIGNS OF AUTISM-0 TO 2 YEARS

1st Year

Social skills

Joint Attention

- Social Smile-2 months
- Following gaze-8 months
- Follow a point-10 to 12 months
 Communication
- Babbling-6 months
- Alternating to— and fro— pattern of vocalization-6 months
- Turning to own name-8 to 10 months
- Waves bye bye-12 months
- "Give it to me" with gestures-11 to 12 months

2nd Year

Social Skills

Joint Attention

- Point to out of reach objects-12 to 14 months
- Point and look between object and parent-14 to 16 months
- Show objects to parents-14 to 16 months
- Point to interesting object-14 to 16 months

Communication

1st Year

Social skills

- Lack of progressive development of joint attention
- Limited eye contact
- Content to be alone
- May become attached to a hard object

Stereotypical/Repetitive

Behaviors

- Excessive mouthing of objects
- Aversion to social touch

Communication

- Lack of alternating pattern of vocalization-6 months
- Not babbling-12 months (rule out hearing loss)
- Lack of pre-speech gestures (waving, pointing, showing)
- Poor response to name

2nd Year

Social Skills

- Seems independent (uses advanced motor skills to attain objects rather than requesting
- Abnormal eye contact
- No pretend play i.e. feed the doll Stereotypical/Repetitive

Behaviors

- Inappropriate use of objects
- Hand and finger mannerismsemerge at 3 years
- Hyper or Hyposensitivity to sounds, textures, taste, visual stimuli

Communication

- No words by 16 months
- No two word phrases by 24 months
- Echolalia-stereotypic repetition of words
- Does not respond to name
- Does not follow commands
- Regression of language at any age

(I) A total of 6 or more items from (A), (B) and (C) with at least 2 From (A) and 1 each from (B) and (C)

(A) Social Interaction-Impairment in:

- Use of multiple nonverbal behaviors
- Failure too develop peer relationships*
- Lack of spontaneous seeking to share enjoyment, interests or achievements with other people

(B) Communication:

- Spoken language-either delay or lack of
- If adequate speech, difficulty in initiating or sustaining conversation*
- Stereotyped, repetitive or idiosyncratic language
- Lack of varied, spontaneous, make-believe play or social imitative play

(C) Restricted Repetitive and stereotyped patterns of behavior, interests and activities:

- Preoccupation with one or more stereotyped/restricted patterns of interest that is abnormal in intensity or focus
- Inflexible adherence to specific, nonfunctional routines or rituals
- Stereotyped/repetitive motor mannerisms*
- Persistent preoccupation with parts of objects

(II) Delays or abnormal functioning in at least one of the following areas, with onset prior to age 3 years:

- (A) Social interaction
- (B) Language used in social communication
- (C) Symbolic or imaginative play
- *Criteria are difficult to apply to children under 3 years

Age 0 to 2 years

Surveillance

- Family History of Autism Spectrum
 Disorder (ASD)-18% increased risk if sibling with ASD
- Assessment of Developmental
 Milestones-Joint attention deficits the
 most robust clue to autism
- Parental Concern-80 to 90% recognize child abnormalities <24 months
